### Director's Welcome

The past year has been a transformative time for the Ontario Network of Sexual Assault/Domestic Violence Treatment Centres (SA/DVTC). The role of a Provincial Director was established, a new website was launched and we celebrated the 25th Anniversary of the Network, among other achievements that you will read about in this report.

In 2018, the Ministry of Health (MOH) and Women's College Hospital signed an agreement regarding the management and administration of the provincial SA/DVTC funds. This contract led to the creation of a Director role for the Network, which replaced the previous Provincial Coordinator role.

Additionally, the MOH increased the provincial network funding to support a number of initiatives related to operation-specific activities. These initiatives included the following:

- Enhanced funding for Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) training and Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) training for social workers/counsellors
- Development of a province-wide clinical database to support standardized data collection, generate required reports and assist in evaluating programs to assess whether Standards of Care are met
- Continued support for clinicians at SA/DV Treatment Centres across the province through education opportunities and a strategy to address vicarious trauma among clinicians
- Increased HIV PEP funding for SA/DVTC clients
- Secured funding for provincial Network staff who support activities and initiatives

With an overall goal to ensure comprehensive and timely care to victims/survivors of sexual assault and domestic violence, the initiatives outlined above help provide our skilled clinicians with education and engagement strategies.

Our work wouldn't be possible without the dedication and commitment of our clinicians across the province. This annual report details the Network's accomplishments and more for 2018-2019 — we hope you enjoy reviewing the highlights

## Celebrating

### 25 Years

### of the Network

The year 2018 marked the 25th anniversary of the Network.

Our history dates back to 1993, when the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care established the Ontario Network of Sexual Assault Treatment Centres. Five years later, we received enhanced funding to expand our mandate to include the provision of care to victims/survivors of domestic violence and we became officially known as the Ontario Network of Sexual Assault/Domestic Violence Treatment Centres.

Since the Network's founding, the role of the forensic nurse on our teams has evolved significantly. The introduction of the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner in 1995 — in addition to the HIV PEP program, Drug Facilitated Sexual Assault care and inclusion of child victims/survivors of abuse and sexual violence — have all enhanced the nursing role.

As well, a comprehensive continuum of care has been ensured through the provision of counselling services, provided by our highly skilled, traumainformed social workers/counsellors, many who are trained in the therapeutic technique of EMDR.



Twenty-five years later, we continue to be inspired by the clinicians at our Centres who are passionate and dedicated to ensuring that victims/survivors of sexual assault/domestic violence receive compassionate health and forensic care. We've grown to become a Network of 35 centres with over 500 staff members — and we look forward to continuing to provide leadership and support through advocacy, education and research for the years to come.

# Education & Training

#### **Clinical Education Forum**

The Network organized a Clinical Education Forum on February 28th & March 1st 2019, bringing together 200 nurses, physicians, social workers and program leaders from the 35 SA/DVTCs across Ontario. Thirty-five presenters with expertise in their respective fields spoke on a range of topics, reflecting the broad learning needs identified by clinicians across the province.

Keynote presentation topics included human trafficking, justice and legal sectors, the Unfounded Report, and vicarious trauma. In addition, clinicians participated in workshop sessions focused on the acute and counselling aspects of SA/DV care.

Topics ranged from documentation of injuries, updates to the sexual assault evidence kit, the Partner Assault Response program, the ODARA risk assessment tool, as well as social work, nursing and pediatric case reviews.

# Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) Training

There are two components to Ontario SANE training: an e-learning online module and inperson training.

#### SANE Online Training

The Network offers the SANE online modules to all nurses at the 35 SA/DVTCs. The 15 modules in this e-learning course provide nurses with specialized education in the role of the Nurse Examiner and forensic nursing, covering a wide range of topics including: cultural competency, trauma and crisis intervention, physical assessment, medico-legal forensic photography, Sexual Assault Evidence Kit (SAEK), pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections, drug facilitated sexual assault, the judicial process, and pediatric care.

In 2018-2019, over 75 new nurses registered for the online training. A thorough review and revision of the SANE online modules, originally developed in 2007, was completed in early 2019. New modules reflecting current best practices were created and will be launched in the upcoming fiscal year, replacing the existing modules.

### Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) Training

#### SANE In-Person Training

47 nurses from 23 SA/DVTCs across the province attended the SANE in-person training.


The training, held in Toronto from November 19 - 22, 2018, builds on learning from the online modules and practical experience with cases. The sessions are taught by professionals with expertise in their respective fields. The training ensures nurses maintain knowledge, skill and judgement to provide high quality care. Through the provision of this comprehensive training, the Network continues to strengthen the capacity of nurses to meet the diverse needs of Ontario's population.

#### **EMDR**

Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) is a widely recognized therapeutic intervention that assists victims in their recovery and alleviates post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) symptoms.

In 2018-2019, 14 Social Workers from 9 SA/DVTCs across the province attended EMDR training. This training, approved by the EMDR International Association and provided in two parts, provides clinicians with the knowledge and skills to utilize EMDR therapy, including a comprehensive understanding of case conceptualization and treatment planning and the ability to integrate EMDR therapy into clinical practice.

In addition, the Network continued to provide ongoing EMDR consultations with a certified practitioner to over 30 EMDR trained clinicians. The training and consultations provide clinicians with enhanced knowledge and skills in compliance with the SA/DVTC Standards of Care.




# Network *Statistics* 2018-2019

The following section reports client data collected over the past fiscal year from 35 treatment centres across Ontario. The Network collects statistics from the treatment centres on a quarterly basis through report templates. Progress reports are provided to the Ministry of Health and Long-term Care and aide in assessing need and direction of future resources.

For the purpose of Network reporting, an acute visit is categorized as a visit within 12 days of an assault. A non-acute visit are those which occur following 12 days of an assault. Adult clients are classified as those 16 years of age and older, while pediatric clients are 15 years of age and under.


#### **Three Year Trend in Client Volume**

The above graph depicts acute and non-acute adult and pediatric client totals across each fiscal year. Client volumes have consistently increased from 2016-2017 to 2018-2019.


# Number of Acute Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence and Pediatric Clients, by Month 2018-2019



The graph above shows the number of acute sexual assault, domestic violence and pediatric clients who presented to the treatment centres from April 2018 to March 2019. Over the 12 month period, the number of adult clients presenting acutely for sexual assault was consistently higher than the number of clients presenting for domestic violence (second highest), and pediatric clients (lowest).

On average, 270 clients presented for sexual assault per month across the province. Comparatively, 115 clients on average presented for domestic violence per month, while 59 pediatric clients on average presented per month.

# Number of Acute Sexual Assault, Domestic Violence and Pediatric Clients, by Month 2018-2019



As seen in the graph above, the proportion of clients with police involvement has remained fairly consistent over the past 3 fiscal years.


### Sexual Assault Cases, by Gender

Out of a total 3,674 cases for sexual assault, including both acute and non-acute clients, 3,450 identified as female, 196 identified as male and 28 identified as transgender.




# Domestic Violence Cases, by Gender

Out of a total 1,804 cases for domestic violence, including both acute and non-acute clients, 1,748 identified as female, 53 identified as male and 3 identified as transgender.



# Three Year Trend in Pediatric Clients, by Age Group




In 2018-2019, 39% percent of pediatric clients were between the ages of 0-6, 22% of clients were between the ages of 7-12, and 39% of pediatric clients were between the ages of 13-15.

#### Pediatric Clients, by Gender

Out of a total 998 pediatric clients, including both acute and non-acute clients, 841 identified as female, 155 identified as male and 2 identified as transgender.



### Counselling & Follow-Up




Counselling provides therapeutic intervention through a trauma-informed lens.

Across 35 SA/DVTCs, 6,007 clients received counselling in the 2018-2019 fiscal year. Of this total, 3,619 were sexual assault clients, 1,413 were domestic violence clients, and 975 were pediatric clients.

Follow-up activities for the 2018-2019 fiscal year totaled 12,984. These activities included calls and in-person visits. Clients seen in follow-up included those seen for sexual assault, domestic violence and pediatric clients.

### **HIV PEP Completion Rates**



HIV PEP treatments, which consists of a 28-day medication regimen, were completed at a rate of 44% among clients who initiated HIV PEP. The number one reason for discontinuing HIV PEP in 2018-2019 was loss to follow-up (client absent for scheduled appointment/unable to contact the client).


### Database

The design, implementation and web-based structure of a provincial database has been an ongoing priority for the Network. This database will securely collect and store service delivery data. Ultimately, serving as a tool to generate required reports, assess adherence to our Standards of Care and provide information about the clients and the care received through the SADVTC service- from the acute visit, to follow-up care and the counselling service.

This year, the Network has worked closely with Women's College Hospital's privacy office and IM/IT departments. Progress was made to determine levels of encryption and ensure secure data storage.

This database is built with the intentions to have the capacity to generate standard reports for individual treatment centres. Furthermore, the database will enhance reporting to the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care and will support Quality Improvement initiatives.





# Website Redesign

In 2018, we were pleased to launch our newly designed website: sadvtreatmentcentres.ca. We hope that it provides a clear message of who we are, what we stand for, and the values that guide and inform our work of supporting survivors across Ontario.

As part of our commitment to keeping our services easily accessible, the new site makes it easier for survivors to find a location closest to them and get the help they need. We have created a more navigable website which features our Network resources, research projects, and online training modules for both survivors and the healthcare community.

There is also a Member access area, which offers exclusive resources for Network staff. As a Member, these individuals have access to additional trainings, Network Committee pages, and documentation and guidelines. To date, we have over 350 clinicians registered as Members on the website.

In a major improvement, the site is fully compatible with mobile devices, making it easy to navigate on a wide range of web browsers and portable devices. The site now contains integrated social media buttons for social media (Facebook, Twitter and YouTube) to help seamlessly locate and share information/resources.

### Research

Assault/Domestic Violence Treatment Centres and Dr. Janice Du Mont of Women's College Research Institute, Women's College Hospital, has led to many innovations to SANE-led services. Founded on an integrated Knowledge Translation (KT) approach, the partnership's iterative program of research has advanced knowledge, policy, and practice to optimize the care provided to diverse survivors of sexual assault, intimate partner violence, and elder abuse across Ontario. Integrated KT emphasizes "involving knowledge users as equal partners alongside researchers [so that] research ... is more relevant to, and more likely to be useful to, the knowledge users" (Canadian Institutes of Health Research, 2015). The impact of this approach has meant that knowledge users, including Network Program Managers/Coordinators and/or staff, have been involved in various stages of the research process from idea formation through to dissemination of the findings.

In the past year, this partnership continued to make significant strides in research in several ongoing projects to enhance the experiences of clients of Sexual Assault/Domestic Violence Treatment Centres. Additionally, the Ontario Network of Sexual Assault/Domestic Violence Treatment Centres has participated in other research related activities to improve the experiences of survivors of violence (e.g., Recognizing and responding to the commonly misunderstood reactions to sexual assault). # Enhancing post-sexual assault services for transgender survivors: An initial assessment of care provided by specialized hospital-based violence services in Ontario


Funded by Women's Xchange 15k Challenge and guided by an advisory group of trans community members and their allies, the Network Program Managers/Coordinators and nursing staff were surveyed in 2017 about their ability to provide sensitive, informed, and appropriate acute health services for trans survivors of sexual assault and identified a pressing need for (further) training on trans-affirming care.


# Developing an online curriculum for nurses on providing trans affirming post-sexual assault care

Funded by Women's Xchange 15k Challenge and guided by Rainbow Health Ontario and an Advisory Group of trans community members and their allies, we adapted and expanded the in-person trans-affirming care curriculum to an e-learning version for nurses who have already completed online Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner Training. It is currently being piloted.

### Development, evaluation, and implementation of an online elder abuse nurse examiner curriculum



With funding from the Government of Ontario, we developed an e-learning version of the 2015 in-person Elder Abuse Nurse Examiner Curriculum. # Working at the intersections of elder abuse and violence against women sectors: An interdisciplinary forum of international leaders to advance research, policy, and practice

The International Knowledge Exchange Forum, hosted by Women's College Research Institute, the Network, and Elder Abuse Ontario, was held in November 2017. The purpose of the forum, funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada, was to bring together key stakeholders, including Network Program Managers/Coordinators, scholars/researchers, government decision-makers, leaders of professional associations, directors of service provision, and trainees to learn from interdisciplinary and international experts working at the cutting edge of the elder abuse and violence against women sectors and to set research priorities in the area.
