PLEASED WITH CARE AT SA/DV TREATMENT CENTRES

96% felt safe during their visit

96% felt they were treated with respect

97% rated overall care as Excellent or Good

96% would recommend the service they received

21% of these women reported living with multiple disABILITIES. The most common combination was PSYCHOLOGICA AND PHYSICAL

Only ½ of women living with disABILITIES were ACCOMPANIED to a SA/DV treatment centre







Women living with disABILITIES were more likely to be vulnerable and socially isolated:
